ExComm Meeting 21 June 2009

In attendance: Mark Becker, Tom Shiel, Ann Majeske, Yvonne Crocker, Deb Stone (ExComm members)

Ric Werme, Elizabeth Becker, Holly Geen, Richard Conde and Sammi the Wonder Dog

Called to order 4:55pm

RG Update: Holly & Elizabeth presented 2 hotels to the ExComm – Best Western (Portsmouth) and Hampton Inn (Bow).

1. BW has 3000 sqft of meeting rooms, hospitality in very large hallway outside, suites one floor up for other event rooms, all in a separate part of the room away from majority of guest rooms. Also very favorable room rate, (currently) some smoking guest rooms and will let us bring in our own food/drink.
2. HI has only about ½ this meeting space, we can take over hotel's breakfast room except at breakfast, our own wing, no room guarantees needed, only 2 miles from Deb's house and we can bring in our own food/drink.
3. Mark moved, Yvonne seconded that we pursue BW first, vote unanimous. Deb & Elizabeth to meet with them to discuss additional requests (e.g. room rate for days before & after RG, possible comps of suites, check on furniture moving, etc. to be built into contract. (meeting held 06/24.)
4. Flyers to go to AG including BW as the hotel (with comments that we're almost sure!)

Membership:

2. We will be printing & sending postcards to lapsed members to encourage renewal.

Testing:

1. John reported 4 signed up for 06/17 test, 2 tested

Scholarship:

1. Deb presented top 3 NH scored essays. Mark moved, Tom seconded that we give 2 scholarships (to our top 2 scored essays). Unanimous vote, pending confirmation from Wayne that we have enough to award the amounts the ExComm wants. Once \$\$ are confirmed, we will notify winners.
2. Also, Ann agreed to be Scholarship Chair for this year (Deb to help if

necessary.)

No Report – Treasurer, Public Relations, Young M, Gifted Children

Discussion of VT joint event. There had been some talk about an event including recruitment drive but it looks like that is not happening.

Photography Policy: Some discussion of photography clause (example supplied by National/Chicago) that says that – in effect - attendance at an event constitutes permission for pictures. Deb presented letter from Eric Postpischil asking for a fully thought-out photography policy recognizing that some people don't want picture taken. For further discussion at July meeting.

ME Funding: Ann asked for confirmation of funds transferred to NHM when ME joined. Discussion of (assuming we can confirm) what is the right thing to do with any excess funds. Further discussion at July meeting.

FSM/ExComm dates: Sunday is not working to well for attendance; Deb proposed we go back to a weeknight. Deb to contact regular attendees who were not at this month's meeting to see if that works for most of us.

Fall Mountain Climb October 2-4, 2009 North Conway, N.H.

New England has wonderful mountains, enjoyable seashores, and lively cities. New England also has Mensa! This fall, we combine the mountain part with the Mensa part for a wonderful weekend. Not only is this the best time for wonderful hiking weather, but it's also the time for wonderful leaf colors!

The Mountain Climb will take place at David Heimann's ski club lodge, Skiwheelers Ski Club, located in North Conway, NH (see "www.skiwheelers.org" for further information). The lodge is a lovely 19th century building, originally built as an inn. In the 1970s it was used as the location for the movie "Return of the Secaucus Seven". It is close enough to the center of North Conway to be easily accessible to all the shops and activities there, yet far enough away to enjoy the peace and quiet of the woods, trees, and country roads.

The weekend is low-key and basically unstructured. The one major piece of structure is; you guessed it, hiking! We generally have two hikes. One goes to a mountain peak or other destination worthy of a good day hike. The other takes a few hours over easier terrain to reach a viewpoint, waterfall or other point of interest. Of course, there's also the 'no hike'; a short walk or drive amidst the new leaves and flowers, some shopping (North Conway has a few places!), or relaxing around the lodge.

The weekend includes two nights' accommodations, two full breakfasts, Saturday dinner, and snacks and soft drinks (BYOB for anything stronger), for just \$60 per person. Registrations without accommodations are \$30 (North Conway has various hotels and lodgings, as well as some good nightspots).

We generally pick out the hikes on Friday night. The mountain hike leaves right after Saturday breakfast while the shorter hike leaves an hour or so later. For Saturday lunch, the hike groups stop at a store for people to buy sandwiches and the like before heading out on the trail. As for the cooking and housekeeping, we do them cooperatively using a chore sign-up sheet, which definitely increases the feeling of closeness and camaraderie.

You'll receive confirmation and directions to the lodge by return mail, e-mail, or phone call. Good Wine Cheap (and good food to go with it) By John Grover



Our garden is now in the midst of some serious harvesting. We have been picking lettuce, broccoli and cauliflower for the past several weeks; and, the herbs have been verdant since early spring. The recipe this month takes advantage of this bounty with the great complimentary flavors of cucumber and fresh dill. And, of course, I have figured out a way to involve the grill into all this.

The wine this month is from a round-about source. Beaulieu Vineyards of California has used a growing industry practice of shoring up its “value” line of wine by importing a foreign bulk wine where necessary. Its 2007 BV Coastal Estates Pinot Noir is imported from the Languedoc Region in the South of France. The result is a smooth, rustic and aromatic wine. The taste is distinctively black cherry with hints of herbs, earth and oak. This easy to drink Pinot Noir matches well, with the salmon recipe below. It is indeed a value for around \$8 to \$9 a bottle.

Dilled Salmon Fillets (adapted from “Born to Grill” by Cheryl & Bill Jamison, Harvard Common Press, 1998.)

Ingredients: 1 ½ to 2 lbs of salmon fillet (or 4 one inch thick salmon steaks); serves four

Dill Rub: 2 tbsp of fresh finely chopped dill; 1 tsp kosher or coarse salt; and ½ tsp ground white pepper.

Cucumber-Dill Relish: 1 medium cucumber, peeled, seeded and diced; 3 tbsp minced onion; 6 tbsp white vinegar; ¼ cup sugar; ¼ tsp kosher/coarse salt; a pinch of white pepper; 1 to 2 tbsp of water.

At least 1 hour and up to 4 hours before grilling, prepare the rub, combining the ingredients in a small bowl. Coat the fillets with the rub, cover and refrigerate. Then prepare the relish, combining the ingredients in a medium bowl. Add water as needed to keep the relish moist until serving time.

Remove the salmon from the refrigerator about 20 minutes before grilling. After firing up the grill, adjust the temperature to medium/high or about 450 degrees. Brush or spray both sides of the fish with vegetable oil just before cooking. I would recommend using one of the grill trays made especially for fish and coat that tray with oil prior to placing on the grill. Cook the salmon about 4 to 4 ½ minutes per side with the grill top down. The salmon is done when just barely opaque pink (almost translucent) in the center. Serve immediately with the relish over the fish.

THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS "GOOD" STOCK

How many brokers (yours included) have called to tell you a story about a "good" stock? One that does well during bad times and always pays a dividend.

Before you plunk down cash on this puppy (soon to become a dog) it would be smart idea to see a price history. Have that financial planner (or whatever he calls himself) show you a 10-year historical chart of the price action.

A chart will tell you more at a glance than all the analysis that can be piled in your lap. Of course if this is a relatively new issue the story will be marvelous. Don't buy it – the story, and look at the chart. About 90% of IPOs lose money over time.

Years ago the widows and orphans knew one of the great stocks of all times was AT&T. Millions of shares were purchased between \$45 and \$60/share. Now it trades at \$25.

Another stock that every broker recommended to the little old ladies with blue hair was US Steel. Just gotta have this one. Went from \$20 to \$190. Did you buy and hold this one as it crashed to \$33 today?

One more recent Buy N Holders is Microsoft. Went from almost nothing too almost \$60 and now trades in the twenties.

There isn't a stock that has not seen this type of action. The wise old man from Omaha, Warren Buffett, has seen his shares drop 50%. It happens to the best of them.

If there is one in all my years of trading and investing I have not seen a stock that pays a nice dividend and goes up every year. It may be there, but the chance of the average investor ever finding it is some place between slim and none.

As a many decade trader I have come to the opinion that it is best to trade the indexes and to long-term time the market. Your broker or financial planner will tell you it can't be done. That is because they have not learned their profession.

Momentum trading with the 200-day Moving Average is so simple and effective anyone over the age of 5 (maybe less) can do it.

There is no secret. You can do it. Watch the direction of the 200-day moving average.

When it turns up it is a buy signal for the Market Index you follow. When it turns down sell and go to cash or bear funds. Do not pay attention to the penetration of the Moving Average, only the direction.

There is a basic truth about all stocks and indexes: they all go up and they all go down. Up is good; down is bad. YOU can learn the difference and be in cash when the down occurs.
